W.I.S.E Survey April 2024

Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive and Engaged in the Mental Health of the community and the wider world

About the Survey

Purposes

*To get a rough measure of the congregation's personal experiences with our own mental health issues and coping skills.
*To assess the congregation's readiness to commit to being a WISE church.

Questions and Responses

- There were 9 questions, many of them fill-in-the-blank.
- 60 surveys were completed; a 43% response rate. This is an acceptable response rate, given that there were no formal reminders and the open period was one week.

What did we learn about our church-wide mental health?

- 1. Our overall mental health picture is similar to that of the country.
- 2. In difficult times, we use a wide range of coping mechanisms.

37% Exercise32% Walking32% Therapist32% Trusted28% Nature22% Meditation20% Prayer12% Medication

Almost all of us have experienced difficult feelings that seem to last too long.
 5% Never 48% Rarely

4. What kinds of "difficult feelings?"

37% Sad, depressed 35% Anxious, worried

23% Overwhelmed	20% Angry

The survey asked about one of the most prevalent types of mental illness: Depression

In your lifetime, has there been a period of two weeks or more that you felt down, sad, hopeless, or empty most of nearly every day?

5. The survey found that <u>three out of five</u> congregants have experienced a depressive episode within their lifetime.

61% Yes 1.7% Not sure

37% No 1.7% No Answer

6. About a fourth of us said that we would appreciate church member support at difficult times.

28% Yes 24% No 48% Maybe, not sure

What did we learn about our attitudes towards welcoming and supporting people with mental health issues?

1. 87% of our congregation think that we should become <u>better informed</u> about people with mental illness.

2. 97% think that it is important that our church welcome people with mental illness.

3. 58% think that our congregation can <u>provide helpful support</u> to congregants with mental health issues; 42% aren't sure.

Survey participants shared a lot of good ideas about how we could learn more and become more supportive.

Suggestions for becoming more informed.

- Hold learning sessions for skill development, which could lead to Mental Health First Aid certification.
- Make materials and resources available: Books, tools films, sermons, outside experts.
- Provide ample opportunity for discussion.
- Engage community support and partner with existing organizations to offer mental health forums, sponsor speakers, etc.
- Organize mental health-themed events like movies, talks, presentations.

Congregants suggested many ways our church could be supportive.

1. We can learn through training.

*Educate the congregation about mental health.

*Provide resources and training on how to offer support.

*Learn how to recognize when individuals may need more help.

- 2. <u>We can Organize.</u>
 - *Establish support groups.
 - *Establish system for regular check-ins, supportive calls.

*Ensure that pastoral care is available

- *Establish e*mergency assistance system.
- *Learn how to advocate for accessible mental health care.

3. We can create a compatible church culture.

*Create a safe space for all individuals.

*Foster a welcoming atmosphere through small gestures like smiling and greeting.

*Find new ways to maintain a consistently welcoming and accepting environment.

*Practice kindness, love, and acceptance.

*Take the time to learn and understand one another.

4. We can provide support.

*Offer a listening ear without judgment.

*Take proactive steps to reach out and offer help.

*Offer supportive programming and recognize when individuals may need help.

Summary

Survey Purpose 1:

Get a rough idea of the congregation's personal experience with difficult feelings. We found that---

Currently, mental health issues such as anxiety, depression, feeling overwhelmed, and anger are not uncommon in the lives of at least half our congregants.

Survey Purpose 2:

Assess the congregation's readiness to commit to being a WISE church.

A majority of the congregation feels that we can be welcoming and supportive of people with mental health issues; the congregation has many suggestions for learning more.



The Beatles, Elvis Presley, and Pete Seeger were all influenced by Bob Dylan. His writing continues to impact our world today.

"Bold Yet Seldom Told": First Congregational UCC Brainerd

A couple years ago, Lowell Johnson and fellow church member Karen Johnson from First Congregational UCC Brainerd attended a "100 Cups of Coffee" seminar led by Wilder Research. Both were struck by learning how far the people who make policies usually are from the people most impacted by those same policies.

That important knowledge sparked a journey that led to more than 100 one-to-one conversations with people from marginalized backgrounds. Those conversations resulted in the publication of a book, "Bold Yet Seldom Told: Crow Wing Community Stories."

Lowell says they first brought the idea of hosting conversations to a group that is working on the church's designation as a W.I.S.E. congregation (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged in the mental health of the community and wider world). After getting a thumbs up, they trained ten interviewers to conduct 105 interviews with people often farthest from decision making: those with mental illness, addiction, and disability; those who had been incarcerated; Black and brown people; and LGBTQ folks. While they didn't set out to publish a book, Lowell said that while they were interviewing they had an "empathy stretch."

"While listening to these stories, we thought maybe we could improve empathy and compassion in the community by telling these stories," he says. "We started asking people if they would be willing to write a story, and they were. Most of the stories have elements of hope and transformation."

Project leaders connected with the Crow Wing County Jail to obtain artwork for the book. According to Lowell, all of the art was created with golf pencils, the drawing tool allowed in the jail. They also did a video series with ten of the stories and wrote a grant to the Opioid Settlement Fund that allowed them to purchase and distribute 450 books to people in the community working with the populations reflected in the book.

"We know that systems are broken in many ways, but there are also stories about how systems do work because people have gotten the assistance they need," says Lowell. "I'm a story guy and I

know people learn through stories. So, can this book help us as a community promote what's working?"

Project leaders are following up with those who received the book to understand its impact. "We want to know if they are using it in their work," says Lowell. "Is it promoting discussion and transformation or helping them take the next step? We know that when people process and think about something, it generally leads to greater empathy and compassion." The evaluation is scheduled to be completed this summer.

Lowell imagines other churches would find value in engaging in a similar interview process and sharing the resulting stories, in any format. "If we can do it here in Brainerd, others can, too! It takes work and perseverance but it's worth it."
