"There's No Place Like Home"

Exploring new places and interacting with people as I travel is one of my favorite things to do. So those who know me well were not surprised when my 3-month renewal time included 8 destinations including 3 cities in Spain totaling more than 16,000 miles. I journeyed with God around a labyrinth in New Mexico, marveled at canyons, mountains, rivers and oceans, created art, danced like no one was watching, shared high tea,



ate delicious food, and visited multiple art museums including a massive outdoor sculpture park called Storm King, and the Picasso Museum in Barcelona. I am extremely grateful that I also had the opportunity to visit my dad's grave for the first time since he was laid to rest in Snohomish, Washington in 2016. It was something I didn't realize my spirit needed until I was in the area visiting my dear friend, Carey. It felt as if God whispered in my ear to go, so I did. The experience was healing and powerful.

During my three months away, I found myself thinking about how I wanted to share my experiences with all of you when I returned to Brainerd. I did my best to unplug and be fully present in each moment, but I also couldn't keep from wondering how the renewal time was going back at church. Were you enjoying the new practice of testimony in worship? Did you learn a lot about yourselves and each other through the Meyers-Briggs and the Spiritual Gifts sessions? What experiences were shaping you as individuals and as a community?

When I returned to worship on June 9th, I was so excited to see everyone who came to church! I have enjoyed hearing the anecdotes of your renewal time and sharing my own. We will certainly continue to share and integrate the experiences and learning as we continue in co-ministry together. My sermons and future newsletter articles will certainly include a few stories from my travels and I will likely offer an adult forum for those who want to hear more.

Pastor Leslie opened with prayer.

The meeting was called to order and moderated by Kim Slipy

Cynthia, as the treasurer, would like expense detail for review. Income from building use has increased. To continue that trend, we can invite organizations and other people to use the building. The church's insurance is now paid quarterly.

The 2024 Annual Meeting received positive feedback.

The church picnic is scheduled for Saturday, July 6th-

Pastor Leslie and Admin. Asst. Terri have created a shared folder on Goggle Drive to upload all of the material from the Council's binders. Terri and Pastor Leslie will have editing privilege for updating and everyone else will have viewing privilege, A link will be sent out. There will be two binders-one for the office and one for the meeting room.

There will be no need to discuss reports fully. Updates can be given if the information wasn't included in the report.

The Door Project is to represent diverse skin tones of people. This is a steppingstone to improve diversity toward people of color. The Rainbow doors will come back in September prior to Pride in the Park.

The church re-naming to be on July's agenda.

Summer fundraising to be discussed at July's meeting.

Money left to the church by Shirley McConnell Utzman, was given on the condition that funds would be distributed at the discretion of the Pastor. Pastor Leslie designated the money as a Justic Fund. Steve Newcom will request money from this fund to support the Faith in Public Life event in October.

The 12th night will be held 1/5/2025. It was discussed splitting the offering with some of the money being used to help repair the organ.

Sound and Video—there may need to be a completely dedicated line/network for the sound system and video to avoid the problem the church experienced going without streaming for two past services.

Kay Cox attended a Ready Zone meeting. If an act of violence-such as an active shooter enters the church-don't stay in place; look for objections to throw; have a safe place designated to go.

The following resolution of acknowledgement for Alvin Velsvaag was offered by Dan Hegstad and seconded by Steve Newcom and passed unanimously; "We recognize your pain, and we hear you as best we are able. We would like you to know that we want you to stay, and we love you."

It was motioned and passed to change the by-laws to allow non-voting members to serve as Members-at-large. Georgia-Clerk will update bi-laws and present them at July Council Meeting.





The Rev. Dr. Steven Newcom, Messenger



Pastor Newcom will reflect on the profound and timeless wisdom of Micah 6:8, which calls us to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God. How does this ancient call speak to our modern time, and what is required of us today? By exploring this powerful scripture, we uncover enduring relevance and transformative potential for our lives today. The prophet Micah envisioned a society rooted in justice, compassion, and humility—values that resound loudly in today's world of division and polarization. Micah was a common citizen from a small village in the foothills southwest of Jerusalem, yet his prophetic words echo through the centuries. Grounded in our knowledge of what is good, how can we embrace this call to justice, mercy, and humility and come together to transform our communities?

Pastor Newcom serves as volunteer Pastor of Justice Ministries, First Congregational United Church of Christ, and facilitates Lakes Area Justice Table. Before retirement he was Founding Director of Kaleo Center for Faith, Justice, & Social Transformation, housed at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities. The Center was launched in 2010 to advance social transformation as a practical theological discipline and core ministerial competency. In 2015 Newcom created a MA and MDiv Concentration in social Transformation for United and was its founding Program Director. Kaleo Center was an outgrowh of Newcom's Bush Foundation Fellowship, which researched justice education within theological contexts. Kaleo Center also served as a multi-faith-movement hub supporting marriage equality and the movement for Black lives. Before launching Kaleo Center, Newcom served the Headwaters Foundation for Justice as Executive Director for 18 years and previously worked for the Greater Minneapolis Council of Churches.



Grief is inevitable in our lives in response to losses small, medium, or large. We live grief saturated lives that destabilize and shatter our sense of identity over and over. Grief has many faces. The pandemic laid bare our personal grief, our grief regarding political and institutional history and decline, our grief around continuing racial injustice, our grief prompted by economic insecurity, and our grief in the face of mounting evidence of climate change and extinction. This is by no means an exhaustive list of how grief visits our life journeys. Grief is the great equalizer, in every life, breaking down and breaking open what was. Enfolded in the deep and wise ways of the earth, we will spend gentle days together exploring the breadth and depth of how we might carry our grief while open to its potential gifts and growth.

OUR RETREAT LEADER: REV. DR. MARTHA BRUNELL

Martha dwells at an intersection of transformative possibilities she calls Oak Leaf Oasis. There, earth wisdom, contemplative and creative practices, and grief awareness crisscross one another. In that space of intersection, she invites a widening circle of others to slow down, to step into a more spacious way of being, and to dare to harbor hope. She offers presence, programs, and practices with individuals and groups as a spiritual director, a retreat and workshop leader, and a writer and writing group convener with additional training as a SoulCollage® Facilitator, an Advanced Accredited Labyrinth Facilitator, a Forest Therapy Guide, a Grief Educator, and a Story Sharer.
